

## RREGOP: Modification of the indexation formula for the years 1982 to 1999

During the last negotiations, the union party legally committed to funding half the cost for the modification of the indexation formula for the years 1982 to 1999, as soon as the money in the employees' fund would allow it.

Remember that the present indexation formula applicable to the RREGOP pension depends on the employee's number of years of participation.

- The years of participation before July 1, 1982 are fully indexed according to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) determined by the Québec Pension Plan (QPP).
- The years of participation covering the period of July 1, 1982 to December 31, 1999 are indexed according to CPI- 3% formula.
- The years of participation as of January 1, 2000 are indexed according to the CPI- 3% formula, if the result gives zero, the pension is indexed by half of the cost of the CPI.

If the conditions for modifying the indexation formula applicable for the years 1982 to 1999 are met, the indexation formula will then be the same as that applicable for the years 2000 and following, that is, the consumer price index (CPI) - 3% with minimum 50% of the CPI.


To determine if the money in the employees' fund is sufficient to modify the indexation formula, an actuarial evaluation is done by the CARRA actuaries.

According to the latest update of the actuarial evaluation, which was done recently, the present situation of the plan does not permit the modification of the indexation formula applicable for the years 1982 to 1999.

On April 24, the Federation reiterated its concern with the new effort of a Conservative MP in Ottawa to re-open the debate on abortion. With the medical specialists of Québec (FMSQ), the Society of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists of Canada (SOGC) and the Association des obstétriciens et gynécologues du Québec (AOGQ), beside the Federation, the FIQ launched an appeal to the Government of Canada to stop any new efforts to re-open the debate on abortion.

The Federation has no doubt that motion M-312 tabled by the Conservative MP is an effort to recriminalize abortion.

## Contestation of the law in Superior Court

25, On May student, community and environmental associations announced that two motions had been filed in Superior Court to contest the special tabled law by the Government of Québec.

Considering the urgent nature of the situation, a first motion to stay was filed to suspend the application of certain provisions in this special law. This was done while waiting for the hearing on the second motion for a declaratory judgment and to quash which covers the whole law, considered unconstitutional.

Remember that the Government of Québec passed Bill 78 under closure on Friday, May 18, a Bill which allow students would to receive the instruction provided by the postsecondary institutions they are attending, with the goal of resolving the student conflict, thus demonstrating its willingness to govern using repression rather than negotiation.
