Working in home care, it's not always rosy!

It tackles the morbidly unhygienic conditions of certain places and their significant consequences on the health and safety of the professionals working in home care. It is more important than ever to plan the home care interventions in such a context.

On the initiative of the Laval-Laurentides Regional Consensus-Building Table (TRAC), non-perishable food items, toys, clothing as well as money were collected to come to the aid of the less fortunate. All of the items collected were given on December 21 to "La Manne du jour", a community organization, located in Mont-Laurier. This allowed the organization to distribute 170 Christmas baskets. "La Manne du jour" gives 190 baskets a week to families in a precarious situation.



619 kilos of nonperishable food items, toys and clothing as well as \$1,622.30 in cash were collected.
